Since the 8th of September 2022, we have mourned the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the secondlongest reigning monarch in world history. Beginning her reign on February 6, 1952, Her Majesty ruled for 70 years and 214 days.

Her years of selfless dedication were not originally on the cards for the royal - having been born third in line to the throne - but one which she took on, aged 25, with gumption and poise. From Winston Churchill to Liz Truss, 15 Prime Ministers have served Her Majesty.

Since taking to the throne in 1952, it's estimated she carried out more than 21,000 engagements over the course of her reign, gave Royal Assent to approximately 4,000 Acts of Parliament and visited over 100 countries as Monarch.

During this time, she worked as a Patron for over 500 organisations, sent more than 300,000 congratulatory cards to centenarians, and sat for over 200 official portraits.

With her "strength and stay" Prince Philip at her side, she modernised the monarchy to adapt to changing times, but her devotion to her duties remained unwavering.

In her spare time, the Queen enjoyed participating in activities within the Buckingham Palace Girl Guides Company (a version of the UK's Brownies and Guides) which was also created for the young princesses and their cousins to palace staff's children. From a young age, the Queen also showed a love of horses and began riding lessons aged 5, something she continued to do into her 90s.

During a period of remarkable change throughout the Commonwealth and the world at large, she proved herself one of the most effective and best-loved sovereigns the nation has known.

Christmas with the crew

We grabbed a brew with our Lead HEMS Paramedic Andy to talk about his role within NWAA, why he became a paramedic and what it's like to work at Christmas.



Why did you become a paramedic? I worked in a warehouse for almost 20 years before deciding to become a paramedic. After such a long time I decided I wanted to do something interesting, something that had people skills at its core.

What does your role as a Lead HEMS Paramedic mean?

My role is to lead the paramedic team clinically and operationally, as well as operationally manage the doctor team. That sounds very formal but, in reality, I ensure the paramedics have all of the information they need to do their job to the best of their ability and support them where there is a training or development need. This could be new medicines and equipment introduced or new guidelines issued for how a patient should be best treated in certain circumstances. A HEMS Critical Care Paramedic requires an extra level of training and an advanced level of skills – what made you want to take that extra step?

HEMS Critical Care Paramedics respond to some of the most challenging and difficult situations. I wanted to challenge myself and see how I could cope in those situations.

How important is the support you receive from the public to you and the rest of our crew?

I like to think about our helicopters as a good way of demonstrating how important our supporters are. There are about one million parts in a helicopter, all crucial to its ability to fly. Our supporters are crucial to every mission we take. We are truly humbled by the support we receive.

What is the best thing about your role that you have seen change since you started? Seeing the whole team grow in size, confidence and ability has been one of the biggest differences I have seen since I started at the charity. But this change is only made possible by the unwavering support of our volunteers, supporters and charity team.





What is it like to work for the North West Air Ambulance Charity as a HEMS Paramedic?

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I think the charity puts a lot of trust in us as clinical staff. It supports us as much as we support our patients. The charity really gets what we do and that means we are able to get on with our jobs.

What's it like to work at Christmas? Does it bring any challenges or an increase in missions?

Christmas is a strange time there's lots of work around it to ensure the crews that are working have everything they need such as medicines and medical supplies especially if the holiday is on a weekend, as additional Bank holidays add more disruption to supplies. Then there's the welfare of the crew. Working in an emergency service you're resigned to seeing it as just another day unfortunately, with at least 12 hours away from your family. We try to add some fun into the day as well by giving presents to each other, or by bringing something in to share at lunchtime.



Prep: 30-40 mins

Cook: 20 mins

225g cold butter, diced

100g golden caster sugar

Makes:

18 pies

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Ingredients

350g plain flour

280g mincemeat

1 small egg, beaten

icing sugar, to dust

Festive Mince Pies

- 1 Make the pastry rub the butter into the flour, mix in the golden caster sugar and a pinch of salt.
- 2 Combine the pastry into a ball knead it briefly. The dough will be fairly firm, like shortbread dough.
- **3** Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Line 18 holes of two 12-hole patty tins, by pressing small balls of pastry into each hole.
- 4 Spoon the mincemeat into the pies. Pat some pastry out between your hands to make round lids, to cover the pies.
- 5 Top the pies with their lids, pressing the edges gently together to seal – you don't need to seal them with milk or egg.
- 6 Brush the tops of the pies with the beaten egg. Bake for 20 mins until golden. Leave to cool in the tin, then remove to a wire rack. To serve, lightly dust with the icing sugar. Will keep for three to four days in an airtight container.

Meet our patients

Family thanks North West Air Ambulance Charity for saving son Dylan's life

A mum has thanked the North West Air Ambulance Charity for saving her son's life.

In October 2021, Dylan Fryers from Warrington, left his home to buy some sweets with his brother Ethan, and on the way was involved in a hit-and-run.

Dylan's mum, Sam, was sitting at home when Ethan came running back into the house.

She said: "I could barely understand him. Then I heard 'Dylan has been hit by a car'. I ran out as fast as I could.

"Dylan was just lying in the middle of the road. It was like watching Casualty without a pause button." 2

Dylan had major swelling of the brain and had suffered multiple skull fractures. He also had broken ribs, a collapsed lung and bruising all over his body.

Paramedics arrived, and due to the serious nature of Dylan's injuries, the North West Air Ambulance Charity was called to the scene. The crew was dispatched by road using one of the charity's critical care vehicles.

Critical care vehicles contain the same equipment as a helicopter and enable the charity's HEMS doctors and critical care paramedics to deliver enhanced pre-hospital care to the patient at scene.



"Sam said: "I realised just how serious it was when the doctor arrived. He came over to me and basically explained they were bringing the hospital to the roadside.

Then they explained they were going to intubate him because he was very agitated, and they didn't know what damage was done at that point.

"It was better to put him in a coma to let his body calm down. That's what they did at the roadside."

Dylan was intubated by the doctor. He was then transported by land ambulance to Aintree University Hospital. He remained in a coma for 11 days. Now after months of rehabilitation, Dylan is slowly returning to normal life.

Sam is forever grateful to the North West Air Ambulance team for saving Dylan. When Dylan had recovered enough, the family dropped cakes off to the crew, and hundreds of other healthcare staff who treated him, to say thank you.

Sam said: "The air ambulance is the reason why Dylan is alive now. One hundred million per cent. That is why Dylan is still with us now and not in a worse state than he could have been in.

"Bringing the hospital to the roadside saved that travel time - they just crack on and they explained it fully to me."



Paramedics help track down Diamond Jubilee Medal!

Two paramedic friends have come to the rescue of their colleague and friend, to track down a rare medal marking the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

To recognise years of service working for the emergency services, it is customary for the Monarch to award honorary medals to paramedics across the country. This happened in 2022 to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, and prior to that in 2012 for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

HEMS Paramedic Mark Etherington, who has worked for NWAA for 13 years and as a paramedic for 19 years, was due to receive a medal in 2012 from the Queen for his service. But after speaking to Mark, colleague Andy Duncan discovered that Mark didn't receive his medal at the time.

The two friends made it their mission to find an award for Mark. After formal applications, emails and phone calls across the country, they had no luck in locating a medal.

On the verge of giving up, a catch-up with their friend and retired paramedic Phil Evans, re-ignited their mission. One week later, the search for Mark's medal was over as Phil had managed to find a Diamond Jubilee medal.

Lead HEMS Paramedic Andy Duncan said: "I've known Phil since we studied to become paramedics, and he is also a good friend of Mark's. We had a little get-together to celebrate Phil's career and retirement, and after a few beers to toast our mate, we started sharing some paramedic tales. The story of 'Medalgate' came up and Phil said: 'I might just have a little solution for you..."

After Phil had tracked down the medal, Mark finally received his Diamond Jubilee award ten years later. The medal was presented to him by Phil at the North West Air Ambulance Charity's Blackpool base. Phil said: "It's a privilege to help a colleague and a friend and it's nice to see Mark get the recognition he deserves."

Andy Duncan said: "We would like to thank Phil for this incredibly kind gesture. We are proud that Emergency workers across the region work together as one team to help our patients, and each other, in any way we can."
