

Our Patient Aftercare Team

Hi, I'm Ammie! I'm a Major Trauma Coordinator at Salford Royal Hospital.

My role is all about the patients. I support them through their hospital journey and beyond. There's so much we do, from coordinating and providing specialised nursing care, to supporting families, discussing rehabilitation options as well as providing a follow up service.

I've been part of the NWAA Patient Aftercare Team at Salford since June 2023. The wider Patient Aftercare Team is spread across all six major trauma centres in the North West.

We act as a link between the hospital and the charity, liaising with the patient and their family, building a rapport with them, and explaining how NWAA was involved in their care.

We support them through their recovery and provide direct feedback to the crew, something they didn't previously have. Now, the charity can find out how the pre-hospital interventions provided impacted the patient and their recovery, often giving a full-circle moment.

We're also supporting NWAA's research through feedback and data collection. This is something I feel very passionate about as it will help shape the care NWAA provides in the future.

I feel so privileged to work in this role where I meet patients and their families on what is often the worse day of their life and help them navigate through their hospital journey, recovery and beyond.




Ayda's story: 6th April 2024

Saturday morning

"Ayda was three years old at the time. She's autistic and non-verbal, so she's as quiet as a mouse.

I'd taken her out in the morning and then my mum came round to my house to look after her while I took my son to the safari park."

"I remember getting a phone call from my neighbour, Sarah, and the panic in her voice. 'Ayda's gone.'

I immediately jumped in the car.

When I arrived, it was chaos, everyone was out searching.

There were ambulances, police cars, neighbours, and even an air ambulance helicopter overhead. I couldn't breathe..."

The police find Ayda

As the police were searching, they heard over the radio that there was a lake opposite the home.

One of the policemen shouted he'd seen her in the lake. They all headed into the water. Taking their body armour off and going straight in, boots on, full uniform.

Her nappy was keeping her buoyant, but she was face down in the water.

When they rolled her over, she was unresponsive, just staring up at the sky. She was so cold to touch. They thought they were too late at the time.

The emergency services start CPR

"The police started CPR. A neighbour's sister, Janet, who was a Respiratory Nurse, was also helping lead the CPR.

Ayda looked so unwell. But then my colleague said, 'Paul, I think we've got a pulse.'

To be honest. I couldn't find it. But the next thing, she took a breath.

That's when the first NWAA crew came over."

The second NWAA team arrive



Air Ambulance Doctor, Mike

"Ayda was very cold and deeply unconscious, with signs she had inhaled and swallowed a large amount of water.

We gave her an anaesthetic, placed her on a ventilator, inserted a tube to relieve pressure in her stomach. and began warming her.

Her oxygen levels improved on the way to Alder Hey Children's Hospital, where she continued to receive specialist care."

The first air ambulance lands

"We knew our doctor aircraft, H72, was inbound, so our role was to stabilise her as best we could and get her into a position for a pre-hospital emergency anaesthetic.

With the other emergency services, we moved her from the lake, up the embankment and into a land ambulance."

A few days later, Ayda woke up

"That day, I thought my daughter had been taken from me. But a whole army of people, police, nurses, paramedics, pilots, and doctors refused to let her go.

From the police getting there so fast, to them diving in the water, and Janet sliding down the bank, then the paramedics and doctor arriving in the air ambulance.

Everyone played their part in keeping Ayda alive.

I'm just so grateful. It's an absolute miracle; it's like winning the lottery. I can't thank everyone enough."

We sat down with our Chief Pilot, James, who's been flying with the charity for over six years!

Do you enjoy flying with NWAA?

"I love my job with NWAA and feel very privileged to be part of bringing critical care to people in need. I've been with the charity for over six years now.

Our helicopters are EC135s; they're incredibly capable and fly in almost all weathers. Occasionally, we get thick fog or lightning, which aren't safe to fly in; that's when the crew might go on a mission by road."

What's it like flying round the North West?

"There's a huge variety of flying around the North West. We go to some weird and wonderful places, but stepping out having landed on a motorway will always be a strange feeling; you're alone on a giant empty stretch of tarmac."

What's your role at the scene?

"My primary role is to look after the aircraft. I'll do a post-flight check, prep the cabin and calculate how far we are and how many people we can carry to hospital.

Depending on the incident, I might help the crew with equipment. I'm not medically trained so I'm always in awe of what they can deliver at the roadside.





The patient is at the heart of everything we do, but if we're out of sight of the incident and the crew doesn't need my help, it's a great opportunity to speak to the public and show them the aircraft.

The usual question I get is, 'Is this a training flight?' as people can't quite believe we've just dropped in on their day. Kids usually want to know, 'How fast do you fly?' (about 150mph) and 'Why are you here?'. The answer to this question is always 'To help someone'."



I was trembling as we got into the plane, and my instructor even asked if I wanted to back out. But I thought of all the donations from friends and family and felt like I'd let myself down if I didn't do it.

To make it even more of a challenge, I was supposed to be jumping at 11,000ft, but my husband paid extra for it to be at 15,000ft. He said, 'If you're going to do it, you might as well go the whole way!'.

It was an unbelievable experience, I'm really glad I went through with it. I was so relieved when I landed, although it was a bit bumpy.

NWAA does such amazing work that's only possible due to public support. By doing a skydive, I raised £1,270 plus £500 through Gift Aid.

I'd encourage anyone to give it a go; it was incredible!

I achieved something I never thought I could do!

My name's Gillie, and back in March this year, I took on a skydive to raise money for NWAA.

I've always supported NWAA, I play the Lift off Lotto and I often donate items to my local shop. At the start of the year, I saw an advert for NWAA's Skydive Day on Facebook and thought I'd challenge myself. 20 years ago, I had a surgical procedure that didn't go to plan, my husband thought he'd lost me. But I'm still here, and I wanted to do something I never thought I'd be able to do.

I can't lie; I was absolutely terrified on the day. I had my husband with me and a family friend who's known me since I was a child, cheering me along; they were so proud. Take on a skydive for NWAA. Join us on one of our skydiving days at the Black Knights Skydiving Centre or choose your own date. We'll be there to support you throughout your journey!
